Talk with your veterinarian about your kitten's specific needs, including their vaccine and checkup schedule. In the meantime, there are key life stages to watch for as your kitten grows.

DEVELOP

Birth to 8 weeks

Between 3 and 10 days old, kittens' eyes open, baby teeth break out, and sharp senses of hearing and smell develop. By the time they are 8 weeks old, kittens will be almost fully weaned.

Behavior to look for

Kittens start to discover the world around them! They spend these early weeks learning to stand, walk, run, and jump. They also develop adult-like sleep and social patterns.



PREPARE

8 weeks to 3 months

As they approach 12 to 14 weeks, kittens will be just about ready to head to their forever homes. While these kitties are more adventurous and independent than younger kittens, they are also likely to be cuddly and affectionate with each other and humans.

Behavior to look for

You'll notice both social and play skills emerging, but your new kitten still has a lot of growing to do. It's time to make an appointment so your veterinarian can advise on litter box training, feeding tips, and other vital care needs.

ACTION: Take your kitten to the vet.



3 to 6 months

At this time, your kitten will begin losing their baby teeth. They may not eat as much or as quickly as a result, and they may also start chewing on things. They will also start seeing you and other family members as part of their "litter."

Behavior to look for

Your kitten is likely to start testing their limits at this time, playing more roughly with everything from toys to human feet. Make sure your kitten has scratch pads and toys to keep them occupied in a healthy manner, and pull away if they try to bite.

ACTION: Get plenty of cat toys.



6

GROW W

6 to 12 months

Your kitten will enter a more watchful stage at this time, observing more and responding less to things around them. They may also start to become more territorial

Behavior to look for

You'll notice more signs of maturity, but keep engaging with your cat and they'll be your bonded friend for life. Check in with your veterinarian to make sure they're growing up healthy.

ACTION: Talk to your veterinarian.



Winter Safety Tips for Cats

Simple advice for enjoying a worry-free winter with your feline.

Warmth all winter

Whether you have a long-haired, short-haired, or hairless cat, it's important to make sure they have plenty of warm, cozy places to curl up in this winter. Consider getting an extra pet bed, or leave some blankets out in different spots around the home.

Adapt to a seasonal diet

Your cat may burn more calories throughout the winter to keep warm. If they tend to get in a lot of daily movement and exercise, you may want to increase their food or treat intake accordingly. But be careful — excess snacks can lead to potentially dangerous weight gain. Always consult with your veterinarian before making dietary changes.

Keep cats indoors

The great outdoors can be full of perils for cats, and winter is especially dangerous. Snow and ice can harm paws, and winter weather can be especially difficult for your feline friend to navigate. It's recommended that you keep your cat safely indoors throughout the season.

Treats should make up just 5-10% of your pet's diet. Some healthy snacks include small portions of fish, chicken, and pumpkin.

Fleece is a sturdy and warm option for winter pet blankets.

Avoid troublesome toxins

Many people tend to leave antifreeze, de-icing products, and other winter chemicals in the garage or basement this time of year. Be careful when it comes to cats who may want to lick or rub against them — these substances are highly toxic to pets and should be kept far out of reach

Leave the flakes to the snow

Cats can get dry, flaky skin in winter just like humans do. Make sure your pet always has access to clean drinking water, and consider using an air humidifier to help prevent this. If you end up needing to bathe your cat this time of year, be sure to completely dry them off afterward. Brushing their coat regularly stimulates blood circulation and can help improve their overall skin condition.

Chilling in the car

If you need to bring your cat anywhere this winter (like to the vet), never leave them unattended in your car. Your vehicle can act like a refrigerator and quickly plunge to dangerous, frigid chill levels when parked. Even if your cat is in a crate with a blanket, that won't be enough to protect them from the chill.

Honk for safety

While it's a good idea to keep your cat indoors all winter, it's important to keep in mind that neighboring cats (and other animals) may be wandering outside. They may even find their way under your car when looking for a safe place to snooze. Try tapping your hood and honking your car before turning it on, just in case.

Some cat breeds like the Norwegian Forest Cat are built for the cold! They originated from frigid climates and have dense, water-resistant fur and thick builds.

Fish oil can improve your pet's coat and skin — ask your veterinarian about adding this supplement to your pet's diet.

On average, it can cost nearly \$800 to treat antifreeze toxicity.
